Review

- MUST
 - 90% certain: We use ‘must’ when something is highly probable.
 - The owner of the bag **must** be a man.
- MAY/COULD/MIGHT
 - 50% certain: We use ‘may,’ ‘could,’ or ‘might’ when something is possible.
 - This person **may/could/might** like to watch movies

Making guesses

- CAN'T
 - 90% certain: We use 'can't' when something is highly improbable.
 - The owner of the bag **can't** be Mr. Green.
 - You haven't done anything. You **can't** be tired.
 - NOT You **must** not be tired.

Making guesses

- MAY NOT/ MIGHT NOT
 - 50% certain: We use ‘may not’ or ‘might not’ when it is possible that something is not the case.
 - Mr. Green **may not/might not** like cats.
 - If Tim doesn’t like spicy food, he **might not** like Thai food.
 - NOT He **could** not like Thai food.

Review

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 - The owner of the bag **must** be a man.
