### Review

### MUST

- 90% certain: We use 'must' when something is highly probable.
  - The owner of the bag must be a man.
- MAY/COULD/MIGHT
  - 50% certain: We use 'may,' 'could,' or 'might' when something is possible.
    - This person may/could/might like to watch movies

# Making guesses

### CAN'T

- 90% certain: We use 'can't' when something is highly improbable.
  - The owner of the bag can't be Mr. Green.
  - You haven't done anything. You can't be tired.
    - NOT You must not be tired.

# Making guesses

- MAY NOT/ MIGHT NOT
  - 50% certain: We use 'may not' or 'might not'
    when it is possible that something is not the case.
    - Mr. Green may not/might not like cats.
    - If Tim doesn't like spicy food, he might not like Thai food.
      - NOT He could not like Thai food.

### Review

#### MUST

- 90% certain: We use 'must' when something is highly probable.
  - The owner of the bag **must** be a man.

#### CAN'T

- 90% certain: We use 'can't' when something is <u>highly improbable</u>.
  - The owner of the bag can't be Mr. Green.

### MAY/COULD/MIGHT

- 50% certain: We use 'may,' 'could,' or 'might' when something is possible.
  - This person may/could/might like to watch movies

### MAY NOT/ MIGHT NOT

- 50% certain: We use 'may not' or 'might not' when it is possible that something is <u>not the case</u>.
  - If Tim doesn't like spicy food, he **might not** like Thai food.
